#### **Subtle Change**

Fontana High School, San Bernardino County  
“Subtle Change” is about how seemingly simple changes in someone can lead to something bigger and that no one should be afraid to ask for help if they need it.

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#### **Never a Bother**

San Diego Met High School, San Diego County  
This film highlights the internal struggle of a teenager grappling with mental health issues and encourages youth to reach out to friends, teachers, and family for support.

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#### **Speaking Up**

Eleanor Roosevelt High School,  
Riverside County

The filmmakers behind "Speaking Up" wanted to tell a relatable story about the power of reaching out, thereby encouraging others to be open if they are ever concerned about a friend.

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### **Every Breath Matters**

Valencia High School, Los Angeles County  
The filmmakers behind "Every Breath Matters" seek to bring awareness to the often-unseen struggles individuals face concerning mental health, as well as the massive importance of reaching out when it comes to suicide prevention.

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### **The Stop Sign**

Diamond Technology Institute,  
Santa Cruz County

In this film, a simple stop sign causes a youth struggling with mental health to stop and reflect until a friend comes along to help him talk about his feelings.

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### **The Race**

Pleasant Valley High School, Butte County  
"The Race" highlights the silent struggles many teenagers face and the profound impact that awareness, open conversations, and support can have when it comes to suicide prevention.

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### **Stay Open**

West High School, Kern County

The filmmakers behind "Stay Open" wanted to help break down the stigma around discussing mental health challenges and suicide prevention. Their film also uses closed and open doors as a metaphor for finding help.

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### **Thanks for Everything**

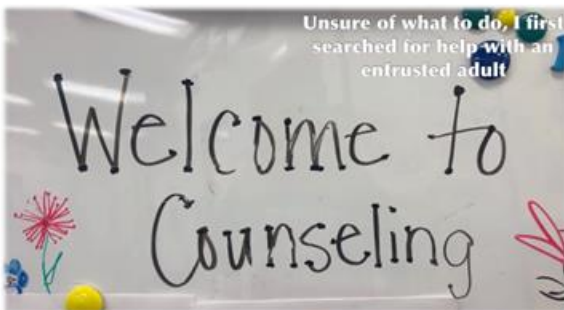
Terra Linda High School, Marin County

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### **Family Matters**

After School Arts Academy/Fremont Academy of Engineering and Design, Tri-City (Lost Angeles County)  
This film depicts mental health challenges and the process of getting help from the perspective of a foster youth.

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### **See the Signs**

Mira Mesa High School, San Diego County  
"See the Signs" sheds light on some possible warning signs for suicide and offers support to those struggling with depression and suicidal thoughts.

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### **Reach Out**

Mission Hills High School, San Diego County  
This film combines archival footage and visual effects to tell a story about the value of a life. The film also spreads awareness of available resources and encourages those struggling with suicidal thoughts not to lose hope.

Eleanor Roosevelt High School,  
Riverside County

This film encourages youth to check in with their friends and loved ones and to educate themselves on mental topics to reduce stigma.

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**Conversations**

Redding School of the Arts, Shasta County

This film provides viewers with a variety of ways to talk to someone who might be thinking about suicide.

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**Helping Hands**

Terra Linda High School, Marin County

A youth notices signs of suicidal thoughts in a friend, asks her about her mental health directly, and helps connect her to support resources.

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**The Reflections Upon a Picture**

Valley View High School, Riverside County

This film uses photos to illustrate some of the signs of suicidal thoughts and educates viewers on ways to get support.

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### Stage Fright

Pleasant Valley High School, Butte County  
A youth uses stage fright as a metaphor the experiencing suicidal thoughts in isolation and encourages those who are struggling to be courageous and reach out for help.

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### That's What Friends Are For

Woodbridge High School, Orange County  
When a student notices concerning changes in a friend's personality and behavior, she takes action and connects her with a trusted adult who can help.

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### Trusting My Instincts

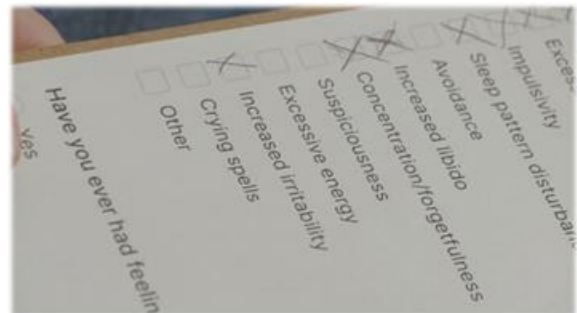
Dougherty Valley High School,

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### Truth Heals

San Diego Met High School, San Diego County  
This film encourages youth to be honest about their mental health struggles and symptoms and shows how it can be an important first step to getting help.

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### **We've Never Been Closer**

Claremont High School,  
Tri-City (Los Angeles County)

A youth reflects on how he realized his friend needed help and discusses his decision to reach out to his friend's mom about his concerns.

John F. Kennedy High School,  
Los Angeles County

A girl struggling with depression and suicidal thoughts describes her experience and reaches out to a friend for help and hope.

### **Breaking Your Trust**

Murrieta Valley High School, Riverside County  
A girl who suspects her friend is thinking of suicide decides to break her friend's trust and tell an adult.

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### **A Call to Macy**

Hilda Solis Learning Academy,  
Los Angeles County

A girl bravely leaves a voicemail for her friend asking whether she is considering suicide. "Our film is a powerful representation of being an advocate for the people around you, and how being aware of these signs can save lives."

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### **Dandelion**

Hilda Solis Learning Academy,  
Los Angeles County

This mixed media film shows viewers that someone will be there to listen if they're struggling and reach out. The narrator is persistent about getting help because she knows her life is important.

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### **Labels**

Pleasant Valley High School, Butte County

This film is about the expectations and pressure put on youth and about how labels should not define whether someone gets help.

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### **The Light in the Darkness**

Eleanor Roosevelt High School,  
Riverside County

In the style of a vlog, a student talks about the support he received from friends when dealing with thoughts of suicide.

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### **Serenity**

Saugus High School, Los Angeles County

After a student distances herself from others, she learns about available resources and decides to get help.

### **I Am Not Alone**

California Polytechnic University, Pomona,  
Tri-City (Los Angeles County)

A girl who is struggling reaches out for help and gets the support that she needs. The film reminds viewers that they never have to deal with suicidal thoughts alone.

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### **The Promise**

Murrieta Valley High School, Riverside County

This film shows how to empathetically start a conversation with a friend and connect them to the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline.

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## 2020

### **An Awkward Conversation**

Valencia High School, Orange County

In a voicemail, a boy shares his concerns with a friend and asks him directly if he is thinking of suicide. Afterward, the friend decides to reach out to a crisis line for help.

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### **By Your Side**

Rancho Bernardo High School,  
San Diego County

When boy notices his friend is showing some of the warning signs of suicide, he starts a conversation with her. He says it isn't her fault and that can't stand by and watch her go through her struggle alone.

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### **Reach Out**

Burlingame High School, San Mateo County  
Distracted by the stress of daily life, boy has trouble concentrating while hanging out with his friend. His friend notices and asks him directly if he's thinking of suicide.

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## **2019**

### **Direct Message**

Encore High School, Riverside County  
This film conveys that it's okay to break a friend's trust to get them help. A girl texts her friend that she's thinking of suicide and another friend tells her how to reach out to the Crisis Text Line.

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### **I Love You So Much It Hurts**

Orange Coast College, Orange County  
This powerful film shares the thoughts someone has about their friend who is thinking of suicide, which show how deeply they care for the friend.

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### **A Journey You Don't Fight Alone**

Eleanor Roosevelt High School,  
Riverside County

The film features spoken word of a girl addressing her friend, talking about the pain she sees her friend is dealing with and offering her comfort and support.

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### **Reaching Out**

Mission San Jose High School, Alameda County

A girl is aware of the subtle changes in her friend and how they may be warning signs of suicide, so she asks him about it directly and connects him to help.

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### **Summit**

Pleasant Valley High School, Butte County

A boy leaves a message for his friend asking if he's thinking of suicide. The film talks about the beauty and hope that the future holds, despite difficult times.

### **Dear Friend**

Foothill High School, Orange County

This film features a compassionate letter to a girl from her friends asking if she's been thinking of suicide and telling her how they will be there to get her the help she needs.

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## **2017**

### **All That Matters**

Pleasant Valley High School, Butte County

This film tells an inspiring story about the special bond between two brothers and how recognizing the warning signs of suicide and reaching out to help a loved one in distress can save a life.

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### **The Empty Seat**

Murrieta Valley High School, Riverside County  
Friends recognize warning signs in a friend and reach out to support her. Together, they connect her to help.

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### **Speak Out**

Boys & Girls Club San Geronimo Pass,  
Riverside County

Friends notice the warning signs for suicide in a friend and seek the advice of their basketball coach, a trusted adult who reaches out and follows up with their friend.

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### **This Isn't the End**

Whitney High School, Placer County

A girl who experienced thoughts of suicide reflects on how her friends noticed the signs and reached out to help her when she needed them most.

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## **2016**

### **Leap of Faith**

Murrieta Valley High School, Riverside County

This film tells a story of two best friends and how one notices the warning signs for suicide, confronts the other directly, and reaches out to connect him to help.

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### **This is Claire**

UC Davis, Yolo County

This film is about a female college student who begins experiencing depression and finds a support system at her college campus Active Minds chapter.

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## **2015**

### **The Signs**

Canyon High School, Orange County

This film educates viewers about the warning signs for suicide using an easy to remember metaphor of a car and traffic signs.

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### **There is Always Hope**

Franklin High School, Sacramento County

This animated film about two girls illustrates the warning signs for suicide and the importance of reaching out to an adult if someone might be thinking about suicide.

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## **2014**

### **A New Tomorrow**

Analy High School, Sonoma County

When a youth begins showing warning signs for suicide, a friend notices and seeks the help of a school counselor.

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### **Never Underestimate the Power of Friendship**

Whitney High School, Placer County

When a young girl feels alone and is in crisis, her three friends notice the signs, quickly drive to her house, and come together to support her.

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### **Pain Never Lasts**

UC Riverside, Riverside County

This spoken word/poetry film is about the struggles young men face. The narrator reminds young people that pain is temporary.

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## **2013**



### **Tell Someone**

Del Norte High School, San Diego County

This film tells its story through a poem filmed onstage. When a girl experiences thoughts of suicide, friends and family notice the warning signs, reach out to her, and encourage her to call the National Suicide Prevention Lifeline for help.

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
